


U.S. Secular Franciscan Presence in the World Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation ~*~ Issue 9 ~*~

As Pope Francis has demonstrated his care for all of God's creation, now we as Franciscans need to follow his courageous example and pray this fast will be the start of a global shift in the way we respond to climate crises.

Beginning Lent (February 18 – April 2) 2015, the **Global Catholic Climate Movement** (GCCM, <u>www.catholicclimatemovement.global/fast</u>), an international coalition of Catholics collaborating to bring awareness to the climate crises, would like to urge Catholics around the world to pray and fast in solidarity with those who are most affected by the changing global climate. The traditional fast on Ash Wednesday (February 18) will commence the global effort and we ask that Catholics in every country include in their daily prayers our troubled Earth and especially those who are affected most by its violent climate shifts; the poor and those who live along coastal communities. Each subsequent day of Lent, will be assigned to a different country; **the United States will fast on Monday, March 16, 2015**.

You can fast from anything from food, especially fast food, using plastics, lessening water use, electronics, and anything that consumes too much from Mother Earth. Attached to this newsletter will be resources giving you suggestions for fasts.



Caring for creation and living more simply are an essential part of faith for those who follow in the footsteps of Jesus today.

The Gospel challenges Christians to transform the way we understand, use and consume this planet. Jesus spoke frequently about the dangers of excessive consumption. He warned of the spiritual peril brought on by too much stuff.

Simplicity does not mean moving into a cave or only eating berries. Living simply means setting limits that reflect our faith values **by taking only what we need – not hoarding, not taking in excess**. It fashions a life that is outwardly simple and inwardly rich.

When viewed through the lens of the Gospel, simplicity becomes liberating for the prosperous and lifeaffirming for those who are poor. By voluntarily choosing simplicity, Christians reorient their hearts toward finding a treasure which will never perish. At the same time, when the value of simplicity influences our personal consumption habits, we can bring about a just society and protect God's creation for generations to come. Lent is a great time to start.

How can each step we take on Earth be a blessing, walking in the footsteps of Jesus?

Forty years ago, Catholics in the United States wanted to respond to famine in Africa. Could people who were hungry and starving be helped through Lenten prayers, fasting and almsgiving? The answer was yes – and the help came in the form of a small cardboard box, marking the beginning of "Operation Rice Bowl" 40 years ago in parishes in Allentown, Pennsylvania. Today, CRS Rice Bowl is a tradition for millions of Catholics in the U.S., who employ the Lenten pillars of praying, fasting and almsgiving to change the lives of others while enriching their own. Rice Bowl is available in paper, web and through a mobile app in both English and Spanish.

In 1976, Operation Rice Bowl was adopted by the United State Conference of Catholic Bishops as a national program. In 1977, they voted to make Operation Rice Bowl the official program of Catholic Relief Services. A cardboard or homemade CRS Rice Bowl is a tool for collecting your Lenten alms. Rice Bowls can be ordered in quantities of 25 from crsricebowl.org or 1-800-222-0025 for free. The CRS Rice Bowl app also allows you to create a virtual Rice Bowl on a mobile device.
